2025 Class Placement Parental Input (Closes Friday 8th November)

Thank you to the many parents who have already responded to our invitation to provide us with additional information to assist with class placement for next year.

As mentioned previously, your child's teachers spend an amazing amount of time with your child during the school year. They are aware of most, but maybe not all, of your child's strengths and challenges from a school perspective. It is their knowledge, observation and insight that provide the basis from which class structures and placement are created.

However, as a parent, your knowledge is far more profound through the simple relationship of child and parent. You hear the story of their daily experiences and know intimately of your child's strengths, challenges and amazing potential. You know of the relationships they have in and outside of school, the learning and teachers that inspire them to do their best and the friendships that either help them to flourish or, at times, struggle. It is within this context that we invite you to write about your child's learning and social needs to assist us in the placement of your child into specific classrooms for the 2025 school year.

When receiving a letter that requests a specific teacher, knowing that the teacher may not be in the same year level the following year, we read it as a parent's way of expressing the type of teacher your child responds well to. In doing so, it affirms the quality, temperament, characteristics of the teaching staff that we wish to foster at St Catherine of Siena.

At the same time, it gives us an insight into the quality of relationship that has been formed between parent and teacher over the year(s). A positive relationship between parent, student and teacher makes a huge difference in the way a student engages in their learning and the school community.

Please note that we may not be able to provide you with exactly what you want, but we do try to do our best given the many and diverse factors that go into making up a class.

Student Leadership 2025

It is that time of year where our 2024 Grade 5 students start to consider student leadership for next year.

Leadership roles that students can apply for are:

School Captain School House Leader Faith and Life Leader Wellbeing Leader Intercultural Leader Visual Arts Leader Performing Arts Leader Science Leader Sustainability and Environment Leader

School leadership provides students with the opportunity to participate in school improvement, to have the opportunity to experience various forms of leadership and to take both ownership and responsibility for the development, enhancement and management of the school.

A student leader's responsibilities are: To follow the St Catherine of Siena School Code of Behaviour.

To be an excellent role model for all students. To show respect to all members of the school community.

To wear the school uniform properly to school and school functions.

To assist students, staff and parents through the diligent and courteous performance of duties associated with the role.

The timeline for the School Leader selection & speeches is as follows: (Suggested dates.)

Week 6: Teachers to discuss with students about applying for all leadership roles. Nomination forms due back Week 7 - Friday 22nd November

Week 9: School Captain speeches and voting to be completed Friday 6th December

Week 11: All student leaders are announced and presented with their leader's badge for 2025 at the End of Year Award Ceremony, Wednesday 18th December.

All Grade 5 2024 students are eligible to nominate and present a speech for School Captain. Grade 4 2024 students are eligible for House Captain, Social Justice, Sustainability and Environment and Faith and Life. The St Catherine of Siena community wishes you all the best and knows that whomever is elected as School Leaders for 2025 will represent the school with pride.

Child Classroom Placement & Procedures Policy

Rationale:

Student learning is our core business and so we aim to provide an environment that positively encourages each child's educational and social development.

When making decisions about the placement of students we consider the following criteria to achieve a fair and even distribution of students in each class setting:

- Specific learning needs
- Individual differences
- Gender balance
- Relationships with other students
- Age
- Social and emotional maturity
- Academic achievement
- Family groupings
- Length of time a class or group has been together
- Class placements in previous years
- Classroom observations
- Student teacher relationships
- Parent / Carer input

The class structure that is decided upon will aim to:

- Create an equal range of abilities in each class / year level.
- Keep average class sizes as low and as even as possible.
- Allow for planned and unplanned increase in enrolments.
- Ensure that students identified as requiring additional support are, where possible, "shared" throughout the school.

The setting of classes requires a great deal of time and thought. Staff use their professional judgement and expertise, along with relevant information provided by parents in an effort to achieve effective class groups that satisfy, where possible, the needs of the individual and the needs of the group. No single factor determines placement, or will necessarily be acted upon. Ultimately it is the responsibility of the Principal to make decisions about classes and the placement of students.

Parents / Caregivers role in the process

In order to make the best decisions we need as much information as possible. Class teachers have an excellent knowledge of your child/ren, particularly in relation to their social and academic needs in the classroom and school setting.

As Parents/Caregivers you are given the opportunity to provide information that you believe

could be considered in the placement of your child/ren. What we specifically seek from you is information about your child's learning or social needs that you believe the school may not be aware of. (Such information would not include a request for a particular teacher or what is commonly called "teacher shopping"). This information should be provided via email or in a letter placed in an envelope addressed to the Principal and marked "Confidential". Information provided must specifically relate to the criteria highlighted above.

The following will not be considered:

1. Requests to have or not to have particular teachers.

2. Information provided after the due date.

NB. The provision of this information should not be seen in anyway as a guarantee that requests can or will be met.

Communicating Class Placements

Class Placements for the year ahead is communicated to the students at their first 2025 Student Transition session.

This practice means that:

- a. Students will know the name of their teacher for the following year;
- b. Students will know which other students will be in their class; and
- c. Parents and carers will have time to talk positively to their children about the class experiences they may have the following year.

PARENT AND CARER COMMITMENT

Parents and carers commit to supporting the school's Class Placement Policy & Procedure by:

- a. Supporting and accepting decisions made by the School; and
- Being positive with their child about the class placement decision that has been made. (Remember you are the "Directors of First Impressions".)

SCHOOL COMMITMENT

The School commits to supporting the Class Placement Policy by:

- a. Using informed professional judgement when deciding class placements; and
- b. Considering all available information, including that received from parents and care givers.



This Weekend's Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 10:17-30

Go and sell whatever you have and come follow me.

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land – not without persecutions – now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'

Gospel Reflection

Jesus reminds us in this gospel that to join him in bringing about the reign of God requires absolute commitment and a willingness to give up that which is most precious to us. The rich man who approached Jesus was genuine in his desire to fulfil all the requirements of the Law to attain eternal life. Jesus guoted to him all the commandments that deal with right relationships with others. The man is able to tick these off and assure Jesus that he has been doing this since childhood – a pretty big claim in the first place! Then Jesus 'looked steadily at him and loved him' - he looked on him with the eyes of love; the eyes that see to the heart of a person, and in that look knew what was most important to the man. Jesus could tell by his dress no doubt that the man was wealthy and so it is this aspect of the man's life that Jesus chooses to challenge him about. This gospel shouldn't necessarily be read as a condemnation of wealth - rather, it is the man's inability to surrender his wealth that Jesus challenges. Jesus sees to the heart of the man and asks if he is willing to give up that which is most important in his life. The man is unable to do what Jesus asks of him and goes away sad. Why sad? He's sad because he knows that he has been tested and failed. He knows that what he genuinely desired was within his reach but he needed to let ao of his position, his status, his wealth, to be able to grasp what he desired in both hands.

From the perspective of ... The Disciples

'What about us?' Peter cried. The disciples were staggered that Jesus could turn away the rich man so easily and declare how difficult it is to enter into the kingdom of God. They suddenly see themselves in the shoes of the rich man: what more do they have to do? They've left their homes and families to traipse after Jesus, believing that this sacrifice would be enough to assure them a place in the kingdom, and suddenly they are faced with doubts. Has it all been worth it? Jesus reminds them that if they have followed him for all the right reasons then their reward is assured.

Have you thought? The Gospel of Prosperity

There are those within the ranks of Christianity who preach what is sometimes referred to as a 'gospel of prosperity'. They claim that wealth is a sign of favour, or approval, from God. They feel that if a Christian person is wealthy then they must be living a 'good' life that God is rewarding through material possession. They use this as justification for further accumulation of wealth. We can see from today's gospel that Jesus would have something to say about such an interpretation! Jesus reminds us that our reward is not in this world in the form of wealth and material possessions, but in eternal life.

Gospel Focus – Sacrifice

Sacrifice is a term that gets used quite a lot in religion and yet it's a term with which modern society is very uncomfortable. We're not really 'into' sacrifice. We're much more into feeling good about ourselves and comfortable in our existence. Jesus called on the rich man to make a sacrifice – to let go of what he really loved and valued. What Jesus really called the man to do was to place his trust in Jesus and not in material wealth – that was the sacrifice he was called to make. Ultimately, the man couldn't do that! He couldn't let go of certainty and security and entrust his life and soul to Jesus.
