## 2025 Sacramental Program

A distinctive mark of a Catholic school is the emphasis on community – principals, teachers, staff and parents working together and with the wider community to educate and develop the whole child: emotionally, academically, physically, socially, and spiritually.

By choosing St Catherine of Siena Primary School, your child is nurtured in an environment which engages with the Gospel teachings as well as participating in the parishes Sacramental program.

Next year's **(2025)** Sacrament dates have been confirmed and we are communicating this early in order for you to ensure that you are prepared and informed well in advance.

All children enrolled at St Catherine of Siena, who have received the Sacrament of Baptism, will have the opportunity to celebrate three sacraments during their primary school years. These are:

- The Sacrament of Penance/Reconciliation (Year 3)
- The Sacrament of First Eucharist (Year 4)
- The Sacrament of Confirmation (Year 6)

The following outlines the school's Sacramental Program.

## Sacrament Enrolment Evening

All families who have a child, that has been Baptised and, is in Year 3, 4 or 6 and wishes for their child to receive the following sacrament **MUST** attend a Sacrament Enrolment Evening. This will be held on **WEDNESDAY FEBRUARY 19<sup>th</sup>**, **2025**, at **7pm**.

This night provides parents/guardians a brief overview of the sacraments and what is the school, parish and as parents are expected to do in preparing your child in receiving the sacrament.

On this night you will be asked to submit a *Sacrament Enrolment Form* which will be provided to you at the beginning of the school year.

## REMEMBER TO REMEMBER

Last Tuesday, as a school, we gathered to commemorate Remembrance Day. As a school, we would like to acknowledge to our families how incredibly respectful our students were during the Remembrance Day Service. The minute of silence was silent, and the prayers recited truly honoured those who have given their lives so that we can live our own in peace.

Originally known as Armistice Day, Remembrance Day commemorates the signing of the peace agreement that ended World War I at 11 am on 11 November 1918.

For most of us, war is a phenomenon seen through the lens of a television camera or a journalist's account of fighting in distant parts of the world. Our closest physical and emotional experience may be the discovery of wartime memorabilia in a family keepsake box. But even items such as photographs, uniform badges, medals, and diaries can seem vague and unconnected to the life of their owner.

For many of us, these family heirlooms may have come from countries Australia was at war with. Yet it does not take away, nor diminish the need for us to stop for one minute and reflect and honour in thought and prayer, the sacrifice these people made for what they believed in.

For those of us born during peacetime, all wars seem far removed from our daily lives. One only has to reflect on the current conflicts within the world to appreciate how distantly removed it can be. Yet for some of our school families whose extended families are caught within those conflicts, or who have fled their country because of conflict, it can be all too real.

By remembering the service and sacrifice of those who went to war, who continue to seek to make this a more peaceful and just world, we recognize the tradition of freedom these men and women fought and fight to preserve. On this Remembrance Day, we acknowledge the courage and sacrifice of those who served and serve their country and acknowledge our responsibility to work for the peace they fought so hard to achieve.

## This Weekend's Gospel

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark 13:24-32

#### He shall gather his elect from the four winds.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven.

'Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you, when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father.'

### **Gospel Reflection**

The whole of chapter 13 in the Gospel of Mark is devoted to a discourse about the future. In the section preceding this week's passage, Jesus has foretold the destruction of the Temple and the fall of Jerusalem. He has also predicted war on a massive scale and the persecution of his followers. Now, in this passage, Jesus predicts the return of the Son of Man and the fulfilment of the kingdom of God.

Why does the gospel include such an extended description of the collapse of the world as it was? Because that's exactly what was going on around the community of this gospel writer! This gospel is understood to have been written somewhere in the period 70-75 CE. In the year 70 CE the city of Jerusalem was besieged by Roman troops who stormed the city and destroyed it. As a sign of complete disdain for the people of Jerusalem and a mark of overwhelming victory, the Romans burnt and completely destroyed the Temple in the heart

of Jerusalem. For the entire Jewish community, this was absolute devastation. The destruction of the Temple surely marked the coming of the end times – the day of judgment and completion of this world. The community gathered around this gospel writer were no less affected. On top of this, the Roman Emperors were reaching new heights (or depths) in their persecution of the followers of Jesus.

In the midst of this despair and fear, the followers of Jesus are challenged to remember the teachings of the one they follow. This passage is written for them as an encouragement to not give up in the face of what appears to be overwhelming odds. It is a call to hope. Although we can understand the context in which it was originally written, we are also challenged to apply its message of hope and perseverance to our own lives.

## Historical Context - 70 CE

In 66 CE a Jewish revolt against Roman occupation began in Caesarea and soon spread to most of the country. By the year 68 the sheer weight of Roman numbers had stamped out a lot of the rebellion. The leaders of the revolt rallied again in Jerusalem and in the year 70 the Roman armies laid siege to the city for several months. Finally, Titus, the emperor Vespasian's son, led an assault on the city and the Romans ransacked and burnt the entire city. The treasures of the Temple were looted and the Temple itself – the very centre of Jewish religion – was destroyed.

## Living the Gospel – People of Hope

Whilst the community who were the intended audience of the Gospel of Mark were expecting the return of Jesus and the end times to occur during their lifetimes, nearly two thousand years later we realise that wasn't the case. Today, as in Mark's time, many people approach the future and change with fear and apprehension. As Christian people we are called to be optimistic and hopeful as we approach the future. We know that God is good, that God loves us unconditionally and that God has a dream for us. That is the simple basis of Christian hope.

### Gospel Focus – Eschatology

Theologians refer to beliefs about the future and the end times of the world as 'eschatology'. The word itself comes from two Greek words meaning 'last' and 'discourse' - basically meaning talking about the end. In Christian tradition, eschatology concerns many different concepts: the end of the world; the return of Jesus; the Last Judgment; the fulfilment of the Messianic prophecy; the accomplishment of the kingdom of God. These eschatological events are sometimes simply referred to as 'the end times' or 'the last things'. The whole of Mark Ch 13 - from which this gospel passage comes – is referred to as an eschatological discourse by Jesus.

#### Absenteeism Flowchart

At St Catherine of Siena Catholic Primary School, the monitoring of student absences is the responsibility of all staff. Homegroup teachers must work through the flowchart with the support of Level Leaders and Wellbeing Leader to alert families and school leadership when concerns are raised regarding extended absences and late arrivals.

Please note:

- Any child having an planned extended absence of 6 days or more consecutive days will meet with the Principal prior to approval has been made (eg. notification of extended holidays).
- When families make Operoo notifications regarding absences, this information will be passed onto Homegroup teachers by the Office staff.
- Please consider the context relating to the purpose of the absences/late arrivals prior to communicating with families.
