On behalf of all the staff, I would firstly like to thank all of our parents & carers for your understanding and support throughout this school year which is now drawing to a close.



2025 Sacramental Program

A distinctive mark of a Catholic school is the emphasis on community. The principal, teachers, staff and parents working together, and with the wider community, to educate and develop the whole child: emotionally, academically, physically, socially, and spiritually.

By choosing St Catherine of Siena Primary School, your child is nurtured and educated in an environment which engages with the Gospel teachings as well as participating in the parishes Sacramental program.

Next year's **(2025)** Sacrament dates have been confirmed and we are communicating this early in order for you to ensure that you are prepared and informed well in advance.

All children enrolled at St Catherine of Siena, who have received the Sacrament of Baptism, will have the opportunity to celebrate three sacraments during their primary school years.

These are:

- The Sacrament of Penance/Reconciliation (Year 3)
- The Sacrament of First Eucharist (Year 4)
- The Sacrament of Confirmation (Year 6)

The following outlines the school's Sacramental Program.

Sacrament Enrolment Evening

All families who have a child, that has been Baptised and, is in Year 3, 4 or 6 and wishes for their child to receive the following sacrament **MUST** attend a Sacrament Enrolment Evening. This will be held on **WEDNESDAY FEBRUARY 19th**, **2025**, at **7pm**.

This night provides parents/guardians a brief overview of the sacraments and what is the school, parish and as parents are expected to do in preparing your child in receiving the sacrament.

On this night you will be asked to submit a Sacrament Enrolment Form which will be provided to you at the beginning of the school year.

Despite temperatures in Melton reaching 40+ Celsius, our students managed to enjoy the beach weather, combining relaxation and learning in the perfect outdoor setting.































Junior Playground Design

The Junior (Prep To Year 2) Playground design is well underway with its positioning to be located under the shade sails to the back of the school, located next to the portables. It is the school's intention to try and have this constructed no later than the end of Term 2 next year. Construction timelines being the main reason for it not being able to be constructed during this Christmas break.





Proposed Playground Concept

The proposed playground concept includes a selection of play elements designed to appeal to the expected user group. However, there are many variations possible and other options available. The various play activities proposed, while fun in themselves, also provide important opportunities for the normal growth and development of physical and social skills. Playground layouts can be altered to suit different areas, but our play unit designs generally include access and exit points in various directions, and are designed to allow easy progression from one activity to another.

Aesthetics are not forgotten and the concept should greatly enhance the visual appeal of the play environment. Along with endless colour options, different construction styles of equipment are also available and the choice comes down to aesthetic considerations and personal taste. In many cases, the same play unit design can be supplied in a different construction style utilising a different material as the main structural element. Specifications and details of our warranty for the equipment proposed are included in the Product Information section of this proposal.

Concept illustrations are schematic and are provided to give a general overall impression only as the actual details may vary. The location of the play elements proposed are shown on the plans, along with the minimum impact areas required by Australian Standard AS 4685:2021. Impact areas are required between any part of the equipment and solid objects such as borders, trees, fences, buildings etc., and will vary according to the fall height. Undersurfacing complying with Australian Standard 4422 (Int):2022 is required in all playground areas, however, along with border construction or repositioning, or other site works, this is only included where specifically listed.

Great student leadership is best defined as the development of a student's capacities to lead others including organisational skills, presentation skills and team-building abilities.

It also refers to the development of leadership characteristics including accountability, integrity and reliability.

Great student leadership is shown in many ways and in different forums including peer mentoring, ambassadorship. community service and citizenship. Student leadership be can demonstrated through a single act such as a student giving a verbal report at a school assembly. Great student leadership can also be shown over a long period of time as occurs when students hold leadership positions.

Great leadership is situational

Great student leadership is also situational. That is, some situations require students to step up and assume responsibility, take a lead and resolve a problem between two students or reach out to a fellow student who is struggling.

Leadership is internal and needs a variety of situations or opportunities to draw it out so it's recognised and leadership behaviours are repeated.

Character counts more than personality

Even though students give speeches and regardless of their merit, in the past it was often the most popular or most sporting student who were elected as a student leader.

Times have changed and student cultures now have greater depth and nuance. At St Catherine of Siena, we want the character of students to rein supreme. Character traits such as reliability, conscientiousness, and honesty carry more weight than more transient traits such as having a winning smile, possessing many friends and appearance.

Introversion rules...just

Perhaps, the greatest misconception is that great student leaders are likely to be extroverts. While research about personality types among student leaders is thin, much of the research around adult leadership shows that leaders come in all shapes, and that introverts make exceptional leaders. And there are many of them.

It is essential that we don't overlook the quiet, even shy kids when it comes to giving out leadership roles. They may not be the attention-grabbers but they can make great team-builders, problem-solvers and ambassadors.

Introverts often need more mental health support than extroverts as leadership is frequently a wellspring of anxiety for this cohort.

Top Ten leadership capabilities and traits

The characteristics of great student leadership are many and varied. Following are my Top Ten traits and capabilities from both observation and research.

- 1. Personal integrity including honesty, a strong moral compass and the willingness to do what's right, not what's easy.
- Proficient presentation skills. Clear oral communication is a skill shared by nearly every effective student leader. Vital for adults too. That's why Toastmasters is full of aspiring leaders who want to learn how to speak in front of others.
- 3. Willingness to take personal responsibility. Such an important aspect of integrity that it deserves its own category.
- 4. Ability to build and support a team. If kids can't build cohesiveness in a group they can't lead.
- 5. Emotional intelligence including high levels of self-regulation. So underestimated!
- 6. Capacity to organise others and then delegate tasks. More management than leadership but part of the building blocks to more strategic leadership styles that come to the fore down the track.
- 7. Openness to accepting challenges.

 Defensiveness is the enemy of both selfimprovement and leadership.
- 8. They are good encouragers. Encouragement is the simplest, most powerful way to build others up and help them fulfil their potential.
- 9. Possess a positive outlook. Positivity is like a magnet that pulls people in.
- 10. They have a benefit mindset -they serve others. Exactly!

This list is by no means exhaustive. It is a guide that we use to develop and encourage leadership capacities in our students at St Catherine of Siena.

Year 4 CERES excursion:



On Thursday, 12th of December, the Year 4 students attended an excursion to CERES Environmental Park. The purpose of this excursion was to support the learning of the Inquiry Unit, which focused on cultural celebrations around the world. The students had the opportunity to participate in a variety of hands-on activities to explore how culture intertwines with sustainability and had the opportunity to connect with traditions through activities, dance and customs to build their understanding.

Learning Outcomes:

- Recognise Australia's rich cultural tapestry, understanding that learning about different cultures and traditions is a key part of our national identity
- Discover how traditional knowledge and practices contribute to sustainable living, appreciating the wisdom passed down through generations
- Participate in cultural expressions, such as dance and traditional activities, to build a community that values and celebrates diverse global perspectives.

Here are some of the insights from the students about the day:



On the 12th of December, the Year 4s went on an excursion to CERES. When we arrived there, we started learning about Indonesian and Indian culture.

We first learnt about Indonesian culture and their traditional dance where we had plates we had to dance with. We also learnt some words in their language. Then we learnt about Indian culture, and we had to do a fake wedding. The girls had to wear traditional Indian dresses, and the boys had to wear traditional Indian clothes too. We also learnt about the gods in Hindu culture.



Next, we had another Indian session and we made Diya lamps as they are used for Diwali, a traditional Hindu festival. Then, we made a bracelet as it represents the history of Rakhi, which is also a Hindu celebration. Overall, CERES was a super fun place and I would recommend people going there more! (Shahana S 4C)

On the excursion to CERES, all the Year 4s were going to learn about Indian and Indonesian culture. I learnt how to serve meals on plates while dancing to music from Indonesia. It was hard to balance the plates on your hands, but I gave it a go and did my best. Next the Year 4s learnt how weddings used to be and what clothes they would wear to weddings in India. The Year 4s tried on some of the clothing and jewellery that would be worn to an Indian wedding.



The last activity was about Indian culture. I enjoyed making a bracelet that you wear for protection and love. My favourite thing that we made was the candle holder out of clay to take home with us. I loved when we go to make a picture out of sand.

I enjoyed CERES and I would like to go there again. (Elizabeth W 4C)

On the excursion to CERES we were learning about Indian and Indonesian celebrations.

We were learning about the Indonesians culture, we learnt about the different dances that they do for different celebrations. There were two main dances. In the Indian culture we learnt about how Indian might do an arranged marriage. We learnt that the girl, after

she is married wears a necklace with black beads that tells everyone that she is married.



After that we learnt how Diwali is celebrated. We were split up into three different groups to do activities. The first group was using different stencils to make rangoli with powder. The second group was to make Diya lamps using clay. These are like a little bowl. The little bowl was filled with oil and a candle. If you put oil in it, the candle can be lit for days. The final group activity we did was that we got a piece of string and threaded beads on it. This is to give to someone you love to keep safe.

Then it was time to go. We took everything home. That is all about the Year 4 excursion to CERES! (Isabelle B 4C)
