THE IMPORTANT ROLE GRANDPARENTS PLAY IN YOUR CHILD'S DEVELOPMENT

Grandparent's Day is next Wednesday, 30th July and for many families, due to challenges with interstate travel and the general business of life, it has been a long time since children last saw their grandparents.

Grandparents play a very significant role in the development of young children that impacts them differently than a parent-child relationship, so it is important to foster this connection in ways that are accessible and safe for both.

While children do learn fundamental respect from parents, Grandparents have a particular impact on this lesson because they do not fulfil a traditional authoritative role. Instead, children learn to value their elders and navigate their capacity for holding significant relationships separately from parents.

Not only are grandparents a source of wisdom for young children, they also tend to introduce long standing family traditions and help formulate perceptions of healthy family dynamics.

Between school or day care, friendships and other activities, it can be difficult to fit grandparents in. But it's not the quantity of time that matters, it's the quality. This quality time can give children a plethora of wisdom, learning and growth.

Next Wednesday, we have that opportunity to celebrate with our Grandparents, to share Communion, learning and morning tea. While celebrations like this one are a great way to recognise the importance of the relationship between children and their grandparents, they are not the only way to do so. Creating space for grandparents and grandchildren to connect can be as easy as a phone call once a week for a few minutes.



SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION PROGRAMME & PARTICIPATING IN THE COMMITMENT MASSES

Ezekiel 36:25-28

"A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. I will put my spirit within you, and make you follow my statutes and be careful to observe my ordinances. Then you shall live in the land and you shall be my people, and I will be your God."

The **Sacrament of Confirmation** is the third of the three sacraments of initiation and is a Catholic Sacrament of mature Christian commitment and a deepening of baptismal gifts. Confirmation perfects our baptism and brings us the graces of the Holy Spirit that were granted to the Apostles on Pentecost Sunday. It is most often associated with the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

If Baptism is the sacrament of re-birth to a new and spiritual life, Confirmation is the sacrament of maturity and coming of age. Confirmation is a sacrament of empowerment. It gives the strength to follow Jesus and to become involved in the mission which Jesus left to the Church.

The Sacrament of Confirmation completes or confirms the Sacrament of Baptism. For Catholics it is a time when we re-examine our commitment to the Faith handed down to us from generation to generation.

Confirmation asks that we explore our personal lives in order to understand the love of God and ourselves more fully.

Knowing that it is primarily the parent's responsibility to bring up their child/ren in the practice of the faith and that the parish and our school community act in cooperation with parents to this end, one of the difficulties facing parents is having sufficient knowledge of their own faith so as to assist their child/ren's faith and spiritual development.

The Theology of the Holy Spirit

In response to this situation – in helping parents to guide their children along the path of faith, we are recommending that you take the time to watch **two** adult education audio video session on the theology of the Holy Spirit prepared by Father John Madden. Fr John will be presenting to the parents and students on Tuesday 5th August at the Confirmation Family Night.

These two videos, provide a starting point for parents to engage with their children to actively participate in the spiritual development of their children while enhancing one's own spiritual development and that of the whole family.

The Spiritual Wellbeing of your Child

The Sacramental Program is central to the spiritual development of your child and encourages active sacramental participation by you and your child. This can only benefit your child, your family and by your support, the whole community of God's people who make up this parish. For this reason, it is expected that all families, whose child is enrolled to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation this year, attend the Commitment Mass.

Readiness

As mentioned before, for Catholics it is a time when we re-examine our commitment to the Faith handed down to us from generation to generation.

If you feel you or your child are not ready to commit yourself to the Sacramental Program you are always welcome to choose to defer for a year or more until you feel ready to make the commitment necessary to make this program as personally and spiritually meaningful as possible.

Fr Alex is more than happy to meet with you to discuss any concerns you may have or to assist you in discerning your child's readiness in receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation if you yourself are not sure they are ready.

This weekend's Gospel reading is the holy Gospel according to Luke 11:1-13

Ask, and it will be given to you.

Once Jesus was in a certain place praying, and when he had finished, one of his disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.'

He said to them, 'Say this when you pray:
"Father, may your name be held holy,
your kingdom come;
give us each day our daily bread,
and forgive us our sins,
for we ourselves forgive each one who is in debt to
us. And do not put us to the test."'

He also said to them, 'Suppose one of you has a friend and goes to him in the middle of the night to say, "My friend, lend me three loaves, because a friend of mine on his travels has just arrived at my house and I have nothing to offer him"; and the man answers from inside the house, "Do not bother me. The door is bolted now, and my children and I are in bed; I cannot get up to give it to you." I tell you, if the man does not get up and give it him for friendship's sake, persistence will be enough to make him get up and give his friend all he wants.

'So I say to you: Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to you. For the one who asks always receives; the one who searches always finds; the one who knocks will always have the door opened to him. What father among you would hand his son a stone when he asked for bread? Or hand him a snake instead of a fish? Or hand him a scorpion if he

asked for an egg? If you then, who are evil, know how to give your children what is good, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!'

Gospel Reflection

In today's gospel, Jesus provides his disciples, and all Christians, with a model for prayer. In keeping with this modelling by Jesus, it is significant that the Lord's Prayer, or Our Father, is the common prayer of all Christians, regardless of denomination.

The parable and teaching that follow the Lord's Prayer make clear the particular purpose of prayer that Jesus was highlighting – prayer as petition. In this instance, Jesus assures us that if we pray for what we need with conviction and confidence, then God cannot fail to respond to our prayer. Jesus in fact encourages us to be demanding and persistent in our prayer. However, the parable used to demonstrate the persistent nature of prayer is not focused on demands for selfish purposes, but rather the neighbour needs assistance in fulfilling his obligations of hospitality to a traveller. He is not waking his neighbour in the middle of the night to ask for bread for himself; he asks for bread to give to his guest. He asks for help to fulfil his duty and responsibility. This gives us something of an idea about how we might focus our prayer. Praying for a pony or new bike isn't quite in the same league!

The final element of the gospel passage provides us with a description of God's love and care by something of a negative comparison: if human parents would not do harm instead of good to their children, God is even less likely to act like this towards us. It's a bit of an odd way around of saying that God's love is greater than anything within our experience or imagination.

Living the Gospel – Ask, Search, Knock

Jesus says in the gospel, 'Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to you.' The actions of asking, searching and knocking are means by which we initiate the encounter with God. If we don't ask, search and knock, how is anyone (including God) to know our needs or know what it is that we are searching for. Particularly in our spiritual lives, it is only through the search and the knocking on the doors of different experiences that we ever come closer to finding answers.

Historical Context - Stone for bread

The stone/bread, snake/fish and scorpion/egg comparisons seem a little far-fetched to us, but would have made perfect sense to a 1st Century Palestinian audience. The flat, brown stones around Lake Galilee look very similar to the flat bread that

was baked in the area. The 'snake' may refer to a sea-snake – an eel – which might be caught up in a fisherman's nets but was regarded as unclean by the Jews. The poisonous scorpions of the region are very pale in colour and when curled up at rest could be mistaken for an egg.

Gospel Focus – Relationship

A crucial aspect of prayer is the attitude with which we view God. We trust in God's character that it is not a pointless exercise to ask for something. We trust that God is even more loving than a parent who tries to give their child what they need. If we did not make these basic assumptions about God, there would be little point in prayer. When our prayer lives falter at times, perhaps we need to first check out our relationship with God and our attitude towards God before trying to 'fix' the ways we pray.
