Year 6 Life Saving Education at Altona Beach



With summer fast approaching, many Victorian families will soon be enjoying time at the beach, rivers and lakes. While these places offer wonderful opportunities for fun and relaxation, open-water environments can also be unpredictable and sometimes dangerous.



To help students build confidence and stay safe around water, Life Saving Victoria (LSV) has developed the **Life Saving Education Program** — a three-step approach to swimming and water safety that helps children:

- Develop essential water safety knowledge
- Learn and practise swimming skills
- Apply these skills confidently in open-water settings

Recently, our **Year 6 students** continued their learning through this program with an excursion to **Altona Beach**. Guided by qualified lifesavers,



students developed their skills in swimming, underwater safety, rescue techniques and survival sequences. The day provided valuable hands-on experience and helped reinforce the importance of being safe, confident and responsible around water.

Alongside the lifesaving activities, students also enjoyed games on the sand and beachcombing for shells. Teachers noted the wonderful sense of teamwork, joy and engagement throughout the day — a memorable experience as our Year 6 students approach the end of their primary school journey, celebrating learning and friendships in such a positive and active way.

2026 Annual Tuition Fee

Earlier this week, all current families received an email outlining the changes in tuition fees for the 2026 academic year.

The decision to adjust tuition fees is never made lightly, nor without careful and thorough consideration of our students' needs and our school's capacity to provide an education experience that supports every student to flourish. We are also cognisant of the financial pressures that many families have experienced this year.

The cost of operating our school is increasing in multiple areas including wages, insurance premiums, regulatory and compliance costs, risk management, teacher resources and professional learning.

Our tuition fees at St Catherine Of Siena are also influenced by the Commonwealth Department of Education's calculation of our community's ability to financially contribute to the operating costs of our school, known as the Capacity to Contribute, or CTC, which is reviewed annually.

To ensure that we can continue to deliver a personalised, high-quality education that is responsive to the diverse interests and academic, social and emotional needs of our students, it is necessary to periodically review and adjust our fees.

2026 School Family Fee

As a result, St Catherine Of Siena's School Family Fee for 2026 is: \$1920. This fee is billed to each family regardless of the number of children enrolled and provides funds for the development of learning resources as well as the maintenance of school facilities and grounds. The Capital Levy of \$200, which provides funds for future capital improvement projects, is included within the School Family Fee.

2026 Student Curriculum Levy

The **Student Levy** of **\$600** per child (Prep to Year 6), reflects the individual costs associated in engaging each child in their learning experiences and activities. The Student Levy specifically covers costs

associated with book lists, curriculum and excursion expenses for each child.

2026 Camping Program

The cost of the 2026 **Camping Program** is as follows: Year 3: \$400 Camp Sunnystones, 17th – 18th September 2026

Year 4: \$400 Lady Northcote, 27th – 28th August 2026 Year 5: \$560 PGL Kynton, 14th – 16th October 2026 Year 6: \$560 YMCA Anglesea, 16th – 18th November 2026

The school, through various grants, discounts the true cost of the camping program. It has been necessary to do this as camping costs are now inclusive of staffing costs, whereas in the past this was provided on a voluntary basis. Many schools have made the decision to discontinue camping programs because of this reason and at some point, St Catherine of Siena School will have to seriously consider the viability of a camping program if costs continue to escalate.

The cost of the **Swimming Program** is inclusive of transport costs and is as follows:

2026 Payment Options

All school fees are due at the beginning of each billing period as per the instalment dates or as arranged with the Principal.

Parent are encouraged to contact Mrs Lisa Nolan (School Bursar) to put in place any alternative arrangement that will assist families in ensuring that the school fees are paid.

An appointment will be made for families who have not attended to their school fees to ensure that an arrangement can be put in place. Please note that all outstanding fees and levies are expected to be paid at the conclusion of a family's time at St Catherine of Siena Primary School.

2026 Fee & Levy Billing Dates

For 2026, the **Family Fee** is billed in **three (3) instalments** with the **Student Levy** of \$600 being paid in full by the **13**th **March 2025**.

The Our Father in Auslan A Prayer We Can See



This **semester**, students have been learning to pray the **Our Father** (The Lord's Prayer) using **Auslan** — **Australian Sign Language**.

The Our Father is a very special prayer in the Catholic Church. Jesus taught it to us as a way to speak to God as our loving Father. When we pray it together, we are united as a family in faith.



Signing the prayer in Auslan helps students:

- Understand what the prayer means
- Include everyone in prayer, especially members of the Deaf community
- Use their hands, faces, and bodies to show meaning



Auslan is a visual language. Instead of using spoken words, the message is shown through:

- Handshapes and movement
- Facial expression
- Direction and placement of signs



This makes the prayer:

- More expressive
- More thoughtful
- More inclusive



Our next step in the coming weeks is to support students to **show the feeling and intention of the prayer** while signing it — recognising the importance behind words like "forgive us" and "lead us." This will help deepen their understanding as they pray.

By learning the Our Father in Auslan, students are reminded that:

God understands every language — spoken or signed.

We are proud of how reverently the students are praying and signing together. It is a beautiful way to share our faith and ensure everyone can join in prayer.

All Souls Day is celebrated this coming Sunday. This celebration has its roots in the sixth century Benedictine tradition of praying to the dead. It was a way of recognising the human bonds which go beyond death. By the tenth century this feast was about praying for the dead, that they might know the merciful love of God.

It is appropriate today for us to think about what a soul is. In an increasingly secular society it's interesting to note that the word 'soul' persists in ordinary conversation. Many non-religious people use this most religious of terms to describe another person. We often hear how others are lonely, distressed, or lost souls. It can be said that someone has a 'beautiful soul' or that a piece of music, a painting or other work of art 'stirred my soul'. We describe mellow jazz as 'soulful' and still alert others to distress by an SOS, 'save our souls'. These uses of the word reinforce St Thomas Aquinas' teaching that the soul makes us human and sets us apart from other animals.

Nearly all the great religions of the world believe in a soul, or its equivalent – something that survives the annihilation of the body in death. I have come to the opinion that whatever else might characterise the soul, memory is an integral part of it.

Soul as memory means that when I meet God face to face, I will remember who I am and how I lived, and God will remember me. It's also a comfort for us to think that we will be reunited with those we have loved who have died before us, because we remember each other.

So let's remember at this Eucharist all those 'departed souls' we have known and loved over the years, that they might pray for us that we never forget God's saving love and live lives worthy of it.

Year 4 - Melbourne Zoo Excursion


On Friday, 24th October, the Year 4 students visited the Melbourne Zoo as part of our Inquiry topic. We saw so many amazing animals — they were everywhere!

During our visit, we learnt how we can help protect orangutans by avoiding products made with palm oil. Every small choice can make a big difference! We also discovered just how incredibly loud the gibbons are. In our class novel, Kensuke's Kingdom, it mentioned that gibbons make a lot of noise — but I didn't realise how true that was until I heard them myself!

I was in Group A, and we took part in a scavenger hunt looking for signs of animal life, such as scratch marks, bitten leaves and dead plants — just like real ecologists do. We also learnt about different bird habitats, including woodlands, wetlands and rainforests.

It was an exciting and educational day — the Year 4s had an amazing time at the zoo!





Hello my name is Bunny and last Friday we went to the Melbourne Zoo. First we got into our groups and then we got started.

We saw lots of cool animal enclosures, habitats and biomes. A few of the animals we saw are orangutans, tigers, hippos and snakes. We also got to learn about three biomes, they were called rainforests, woodlands and wetlands.

I think the coolest thing was the birds we saw during our lesson with the zoo educator, some were big and some were small. I enjoyed this experience because we learnt new things and we all respected PBL. Fun fact, the butterfly enclosure is turning 40 this year!

The data presented above reflects the feedback provided by our Year 4, Year 5 & Year 6 (212) students. It is worth noting that the same Year 5 & Year 6 students undertook this same survey last year.

Our data shows an improvement in all domains since last year.

Some of the outstanding improvements are in the domains of:

Rigorous Expectation - 80% (increase of 5%)

Teacher – student relationships – 73% (increase of 10%)

Enabling Safety – 60% (increase of 9%)

Catholic Identity – 74% (increase of 8%)
